## **51. WHITENACK**

The discovery, published in the 1980s, that many Americans descend from a Palatine family surnamed Weidknecht presents a target for everyone who descends from families of similar name.<sup>[1]</sup> On his website, Don Whitnah posts transcripts and images of the entries from the church book of Adelshofen that are not described in the standard printed accounts, together with compiled accounts of each family group. The European generations of this lineage are based on that source.<sup>[2]</sup> In North America, my account follows that of Cheryl Higgins,<sup>[3]</sup> but attempts to provide more complete references of my sources and a more thorough discussion of my reasoning.

1. Martin<sup>B</sup> Weidknecht was born about 1601, and died at Adelshofen on 24 June 1671, aged 70 years. At his burial, he was called Schultheiß of many years in the community. He married Barbara \_\_\_\_\_, who was born about 1607, and died at Adelshofen on 25 December 1687, aged 80 years. Among his children is:

i. HANS ANDREAS<sup>A</sup> WEIDKNECHT, b. ca. 1644, d. 2 Feb. 1708, m. (1) CATHARINA WEIDKNECHT; m. (2) ANNA ELISABETHA SCHLÜTTER.

2. Hans Andreas<sup>A</sup> Weidknecht (Martin<sup>B</sup>) was born in about 1644, and died at Adelshofen on 2 February 1708. In his burial record, he is recognized as a former *Schultheiß*. He was first married there, on 14 November 1671, to **Catharina Weidknecht**, daughter of Hanß and Catharina (\_\_\_\_) Weidknecht. She was born about 1648, and died at Adelshofen on 12 November 1675, aged 27 years. He married secondly, at Adelshofen on 25 July 1677, Anna Elisabetha Schlütter. He had children by both wives.

3. Michael Andreas<sup>1</sup> Weidknecht (Hans Andreas<sup>A</sup>, Martin<sup>B</sup>) was born at Adelshofen on 1 November 1672. He died in New York between 24 June 1711, when his family consisted of four persons over 10 years of age and one under 10, and 24 June 1712, when his widow was mentioned. He had appeared in New York City. He married first, at Adelshofen on 19 October 1697, Margaretha Barbara Erich, daughter of the late Hans Georg Erich, former citizen of Auerbach. She was born about 1670; in 1710/1, her age was estimated at 40 years, as was that of Andreas Weidnecht. She married secondly, at New York City, New York County, New York, on 16 August 1718, Nicholas Hammeler. Nicholas was grantee of a deed from James Alexander and John Budd in Somerset County, New Jersey, in 1726; at some later date, he and his wife Margret assigned their interest by way of an endorsement.

4. Johann Georg<sup>2</sup> Weidknecht (*Michael Andreas*<sup>1</sup>, *Hans Andreas*<sup>A</sup>, *Martin*<sup>B</sup>) was born at Adelshofen on 15 December 1700.<sup>[6]</sup> In a census of Palatines in New York City in 1710/1, he is listed as John George, a child of Andreas and Margaret Weidnecht, aged 11 years.<sup>[7]</sup> He was living in Sourland Mountains in Somerset County, New Jersey, when he made his will as Johannes Wite-knaght on 24 August 1779, and it was probated on 25 August 1783. In this document, he named his wife as Neeltye \_\_\_\_\_.<sup>[8]</sup> but she only begins to appear as his wife when she first had a child baptized at the Reformed church in Sourland Mountain, in 1741.<sup>[9]</sup> She is thus documented as the mother of some of the children that Johannes named in his will *—Abraham, Hendrick, Neeltye, Margaret,* and *Sarah*—but it cannot be assumed that she was the mother of the children who do not have a baptismal record. These children are placed as issue of an earlier wife.

His inventory, taken at Hillsborough on 18 November 1811, was recorded on 29 November.<sup>[38]</sup>

days.<sup>[52]</sup> In 1880 she was listed as a boarder in the home of her daughter Mary Harker.<sup>[53]</sup> She was described as a woman of 80 years in 1882, from a rough estimate.<sup>[54]</sup>

The 1823 Stout genealogy names the children of Isaac and Rachel, but without spouses, residences, or other details that would assist in establishing their chronology.<sup>[55]</sup> The identification of this Cornelius as the son of Isaac is somewhat complicated, and depends heavily on his military records. He is easily confused with his uncle, Cornelius C.<sup>4</sup> Whitenack, and called himself Cornelius C. on occasion. This is the way he designated himself, for example, in the private record of his marriage, a copy of which was eventually submitted in support of his widow's pension claim.

In addition, the surviving rolls of Captain William Garretson's company, 3rd Regiment, New Jersey militia, all refer to Cornelius C. Whitenack specifically. His term of service lasted from 4 September to 4 December 1814, paid \$8 per month for a total of \$24 at settlement. He was present at Sandy Hook on 9 November, but absent on furlough, being sick, when the roll was taken at Jersey City on 24 November 1814. On 28 December 1814, in Somerset County, he gave power of attorney to Albert Sutphen to receive whatever money was due from the paymaster of the company. John Stout, justice of the peace, witnessed the grant and certified Cornelius C. Whitenack's acknowledgement on the same day.<sup>[56]</sup>

Given that Cornelius C.<sup>4</sup>, born in 1783, was still of military age in 1814, it is not obvious at a glance that these documents do not pertain to him rather than his nephew. The widow's pension, however, certifies that the soldier had applied for a bounty land warrant, which he sold, and about which he had often told his relatives and neighbors.<sup>[57]</sup> His declaration for that benefit removes all doubt: On 26 August 1854, aged 62 or 63 the previous March, he states that "whilst in the service the <u>letter I</u> was annexed to his name in order to designate him from an uncle of the same name, and who served in the same company" when the militia was active.

Cornelius proceeds to claim that, during the war, he joined the company *as a substitute for his uncle*, but was sick and at home on furlough at the time the company was discharged. In January 1855, Cornelius S. Stryker, a justice of the peace in Somerset County, took depositions from some of his former neighbors to the effect that they had witnessed that turn of events in 1814. One of these witnesses was Isaac Whitenack, aged 47 years, who identified himself as a brother of the bounty-land claimant, and Cornelius C., now deceased, as their uncle.<sup>[58]</sup>

In German and Dutch communities in New York and northern New Jersey, a custom frequently arose in which men of the same name were distinguished by their fathers' initials.<sup>[59]</sup>

Among Whitenack men who are found in New Jersey at the right time for the soldier's father, Isaac is the only one whose forename has the correct initial.<sup>[60]</sup> Furthermore, in order to be a nephew of Cornelius C.<sup>4</sup>, the soldier must be the son of one of Cornelius C.'s older brothers. The oldest brother, John, had a son named Cornelius in 1791,<sup>[61]</sup> but he can be identified as the man who died in Somerville in 1861.<sup>[62]</sup> The next younger brother, Abraham, also had a son named Cornelius, but not until 1800—too late for him to perform military service in 1814.<sup>[63]</sup> A third brother, Jacob, only married for the first time in 1800.<sup>[64]</sup> Isaac is the only candidate for the soldier's father who fits all the constraints set by the soldier's bounty land claim and cannot be excluded with other evidence.

By 1830 Cornelius had removed to Hamilton Township, Warren County, Ohio. In that year's census, his household included:

From the marriage records that appear in this county, it appears that there are more persons of the surname who came to marriageable age before 1850 than can be attributed solely to Corne-lius.<sup>[67]</sup>

The 1840 census may justify the assignment of four sons and four daughters to Cornelius, but marriage records name *eight* men (if the two instances of Abraham refer to the different men) and *ten* women. The other individuals seem to belong to the family of Cornelius's cousin, Andrew<sup>4</sup> Whitenack (no. 4, iii, 4), who was born in New Jersey and appears in the census in Deerfield Township, Warren County, aged 73 years.

Neither Andrew nor Cornelius lived alone in 1850. Andrew shared his dwelling with Leah, age 27, and Abraham, age 26, and with Margaret McCowan, age 19, and Abraham Scott, age 10.<sup>[68]</sup> Since Andrew's son Abraham apparently was still unmarried in 1850, it must be Cornelius's son who was licensed to marry in 1844. Conversely, Catharine and Ellen can be placed as daughters of Andrew on the grounds that Ellen was the only Whitenack woman to marry a *Scott*, and that Cornelius's daughter Catherine was not born early enough to marry in 1831.

Two other adults can be ruled out of Cornelius's family, using biographical sketches from nineteenth-century volumes of local history. The wife of Richard VerBryck is identified as "the daughter of Andrew Whitenack, of New Jersey; she was born in 1808 and died in 1861."<sup>[69]</sup> Jeremiah was born in 1802, late enough to be Andrew's son, but too early for Cornelius, who was only nine years older.<sup>[70]</sup>

In 1850 Cornelius lived in Hamilton Township with his wife and his four younger children: Cornelius, Hannah A., Andrew, and Catharine.<sup>[71]</sup> These individuals, if they married at all, must have done so after 1850, and two of the post-1850 marriages in Warren County can be assigned

to them: Cornelius to Minerva Wolf, and Hannah to William W. Williams. Lending additional support to the latter placement is the fact that in 1860, after Hannah's marriage had ended in divorce, she and her children are once again found living with Cornelius.<sup>[72]</sup>

The widow's pension gives direct proof for the placement of Isaac and Mary (and against Maria) as children of Cornelius, and offers indirect evidence in favor of such placement of Osa and Rachel, both of whose husbands also deposed in support of the claim. Rachel and Mary also are the only known members of the family with death certificates that confirm their parentage; these documents place them both as daughters of Cornelius.<sup>[73]</sup> That Jacob married a woman from the same family as the younger Cornelius gives indirect evidence for the fact that he himself belonged to the same family, and in 1860 the census places Jacob near Cornelius.<sup>[74]</sup> This leaves the parentage of John A., Peter, Rebecca, and Sarah Ann to be determined with further research.
